The Certificate in Native Plants offers committed individuals a comprehensive series of short courses in identification, cultivation, propagation, ecology and conservation of native Georgia plants. With an emphasis on participatory learning, courses are designed to provide a supportive and challenging learning atmosphere. Participants will gain a greater appreciation and understanding of native plants in a broad context.

The Certificate in Native Plants is....

Knowledge-based

Courses are taught by experts - university professors, conservation professionals and experienced field botanists who are dedicated to sharing their knowledge, experience and enthusiasm in a relaxed setting and accessible format.

Field-directed

Plan to get your hands dirty and your feet wet! All courses involve hands-on experience with plants and plant communities. Volunteer activities and field trips will take you into the field to learn by doing.

Conservation-oriented

We believe that the old saying "Knowledge is Power" applies to conservation. Once you know the basics of botany and plant conservation, you will be prepared and motivated to contribute to the conservation of Georgia's flora and native plant habitats.

Learner-friendly

Students may take as long as needed to complete the program. Courses are offered so the program can be completed in as little time as one year. Classes may be taken in any order (with exceptions of a few) and at the student's own pace.

4 Core Courses - 8 hours each

Fee: \$105 per course (10% off for Friends)

6 Elective Courses - 4 hours each*

Fee: \$50 per course (10% off for Friends)

Participants choose six courses from a wide range of elective course offerings.

***Make note of time, some electives exceed 4 hours**

16 Hours of Volunteer Service

Participants complete 16 hours of volunteer service with a conservation organization.

2 Field Trips

Participants complete two half-day field trips organized by the Georgia Botanical Society, www.gabotsoc.org, Georgia Native Plant Society, www.gnps.org, or another approved organization.

\$30 Registration Fee

Participants must pay an initial \$30 registration fee to cover cost of class materials.
